

Would you like to go on a virtual Pilgrimage?

The Education for Ministry Program, fondly known as EfM, has been likened to a pilgrimage. Like Canterbury Pilgrims, members share stories and learn from one

another as we deepen our understanding of the riches of the Christian tradition. Although developed by the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee) nearly 50 years ago, EfM is definitely not an academic course. Instead, every session is a mixture of prayer, study, reflection, and fellowship. No theological background is necessary, and the program is open to all adults of any denomination. Although EfM is a 4-year

program, each participant enrolls for just one year at a time. The EfM group here at St. Paul's invites anyone who might be interested to join us in the library
