The First Reading: Amos 8: 1-12

Reader: A Reading from the book of Amos

This is what the Lord God showed me-- a basket of summer fruit. He said, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A basket of summer fruit." Then the Lord said to me, "The end has come upon my people Israel; I will never again pass them by. The songs of the temple shall become wailings in that day," says the Lord God; "the dead bodies shall be many, cast out in every place. Be silent!" Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land, saying, "When will the new moon be over so that we may sell grain; and the sabbath, so that we may offer wheat for sale? We will make the ephah small and the shekel great, and practice deceit with false balances, buying the poor for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals, and selling the sweepings of the wheat." The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Surely I will never forget any of their deeds. Shall not the land tremble on this account, and everyone mourn who lives in it, and all of it rise like the Nile, and be tossed about and sink again, like the Nile of Egypt? On that day, says the Lord God, I will make the sun go down at noon, and darken the earth in broad daylight. I will turn your feasts into mourning, and all your songs into lamentation; I will bring sackcloth on all loins, and baldness on every head; I will make it like the mourning for an only son, and the end of it like a bitter day. The time is surely coming, says the Lord God, when I will send a famine on the land; not a famine of bread, or a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord. They shall wander from sea to sea, and from north to east; they shall run to and fro, seeking the word of the Lord, but they shall not find it.

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Second Reading: Colossians 1: 15-28

Reader: A Reading from Paul's letter to the Colossians

Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers-- all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross. And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him-- provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel. I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

The Prayers of the People

Celebrant: Like Martha, we have much to do; like Mary, we listen to the Lord's voice. From the complexity of our lives, let us raise our voices in prayer, saying: God of grace and goodness, keep us in your peace.

Intercessor: Lord of hosts and hospitality, teach us to be welcoming, open and friendly. May your church be attentive to the needs of strangers and visitors; may your church be welcoming and friendly and so reflect your love. We pray for churches that are struggling because of opposition, for churches that strive to serve in areas where there is apathy and animosity. We remember all who are persecuted for their faith. We pray for Rob our bishop, Michael our presiding bishop, Justin, Archbishop of Canterbury, and the clergy of St. Paul's. In our Diocesan Cycle of Prayer we pray for St. John's in Wilmington and in the Anglican Cycle of Prayer we pray for The Episcopal Church.

God of grace and goodness,

People: *keep us in your peace.*

Intercessor: We ask you to bless all who are overworked, stressed and over-anxious; we remember especially those who have no time for their home or for leisure. We pray for the work-weary, the exhausted and the worn out. We remember children who rarely see their parents and who lack affection. We pray for all who are restless and cannot enjoy where they are.

God of grace and goodness,

People: *keep us in your peace.*

Intercessor: We give thanks for our homes, for places of peace and quiet, for places of leisure and recreation. We pray for all who help us to relax: for musicians, artists, broadcasters and athletes. We pray for our friends and loved ones.

God of grace and goodness,

People: *keep us in your peace.*

Intercessor: We ask for peace upon the nations of the world, especially Ukraine. We pray for all agitated and distressed peoples and communities. We remember before you all who feel neglected or ignored, all lonely and troubled people. We pray for all who have been misused or abused by others, all who have suffered from traumatic events, all who have witnessed horror. We ask that our friends and loved ones, who are ill, may know your love and protection. We pray especially for *(the intercessor reads the names of those in our parish that need our prayers)*.

God of grace and goodness,

People: *keep us in your peace.*

Intercessor: We give thanks for those who are at rest in you, who have found new peace and new life, especially Janet Harrison. We give thanks for the saints and pray that our loved ones departed may share with them in that glory which is everlasting.

God of grace and goodness,

People: *keep us in your peace.*

Celebrant: God of grace and goodness, hear our prayers. Hear in the voice of your Son, your word of love and peace to us. We listen for his voice as we pray in his name: Jesus Christ, Lord of heaven and earth forever. *Amen.*

Celebrant: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Minister and People:

Most merciful God,
we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.

The Great Thanksgiving (Eucharistic Prayer C)

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Celebrant: God of all power, Ruler of the Universe, you are worthy of glory and praise.

People: *Glory to you for ever and ever.*

Celebrant: At your command all things came to be: the vast expanse of interstellar space, galaxies, suns, the planets in their courses, and this fragile earth, our island home.

People: *By your will they were created and have their being.*

Celebrant: From the primal elements you brought forth the human race, and blessed us with memory, reason, and skill. You made us the rulers of creation. But we turned against you, and betrayed your trust; and we turned against one another.

People: *Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.*

Celebrant: Again and again, you called us to return. Through prophets and sages you revealed your righteous Law. And in the fullness of time you sent your only Son, born of a woman, to fulfill your Law, to open for us the way of freedom and peace.

Let the grace of this Holy Communion make us one body, one spirit in Christ, that we may worthily serve the world in his name.

Celebrant: Accept these prayers and praises, Father, through Jesus Christ our great High Priest, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, your Church gives honor, glory, and worship, from generation to generation. *AMEN.*


