

The First Reading: Jeremiah 31: 27-34

Reader: A Reading from the book of Jeremiah

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of humans and the seed of animals. And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the Lord. In those days they shall no longer say: "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge." But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge. The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-- a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. Reader: A Reading from Paul's second letter to Timothy

As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.



We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, reconcile all things in Christ and make them new and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.



A Mini-Retreat on Practicing Gratitude Led by Mary McKnight

Saturday, November 12 9:30-11:30am in the Library Each Sunday, we pray the ancient litany called the Great Thanksgiving:

"...Lift up your hearts.
We lift them to the Lord.
Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give God thanks and praise."

Scripture, the liturgy, and new scientific research suggest that cultivating the habit of thanksgiving can transform our lives. Gratitude maximizes our enjoyment of the goodness of God and neighbor, and helps us recognize the blessings in our own lives. The habit of thanking God for large and small blessings can change the quality of our lives when woven into the fabric of each day.

From a prison cell, Paul writes: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, and give thanks in all circumstances."

In trying times, how can we get better at recognizing the presence and blessings of God? Researchers say that practicing gratitude in the midst of adversity can increase our sense of well-being and reduce stress. Amazingly, a "simple" thing like being thankful can help protect us from destructive forces such as envy, resentment, greed and bitterness.

We will explore the rich meaning of gratitude and experience several ways of praying with thanksgiving. In the two hours together, we can taste only a few ways to pray with thanks and to practice gratitude. There will also be a handout of gratitude practices to try at home.

Many years ago I was involved in fundraising at the university here in town, and I'll never forget a meeting where we had a donor who had elected to give millions and millions of dollars away. Not only to UNCW but to the church and to Duke University. After we signed all the documents there was a pregnant pause. He looked at me and he said, "Bill, now that I have given all of this money away does this mean 'hello' or 'goodbye?" That was like a spear right through my heart. "Goodbye? No! It's Hello."

I thought about it and prayed about it. Two weeks later I got a handwritten note from him. In it he said, "I deeply apologize for asking you that question. I have been very successful in my life. I can buy any car I want. But, no matter what car I drive, in two weeks it's just a car. I can buy any business I want, and I have; but all I get is more headaches. I can eat at the fanciest restaurants in the world, and I have; but usually the fancier and more expensive they are, the worse the heartburn. The only thing that brings pure joy in my life is when I discovered the power of giving away my wealth to help people in need."

That is why we are here today. To offer you the invitation to really feel good about the love and the generosity that our church plays not only in our lives but also in the lives of our community. So, when we think about stewardship, please think not in terms that you have to give away millions of dollars. I am always reminded when I look at the Agnus Dei window that that window is in our church because of the work of the "little workers." I don't know who they are. I don't know how they did it.
