

Faith in Action: Building Our Future A Capital Campaign to Renew & Restore St. Paul's

An Update on the Capital Campaign

July 11, 2023

The Vestry, at its June Meeting, expressed gratitude for the amazing generosity of the congregation, pledging \$1.45 million to the Capital Campaign over a 55-day period. Add that to the \$500,000 gift received just before Christmas and we are in good shape at about \$1.95 million. This strong, faith-filled commitment to the future of St. Paul's will allow us to move forward fully with Steps 1 and 2 of our plans. Step 1 creates stairless access from our sanctuary to the parish hall, and Step 2 further addresses the need for improved accessibility in the main area of the building between the church and the parish hall by updating restrooms, adding an elevator, reconfiguring areas of ministry, and creating more open space for gathering. Step 3, renovations to the parish hall, will be put on hold as we focus our available resources on renewing and restoring St. Paul's to become an outward and visible expression of our commitment to accessibility for all. Completion of Steps 1 and 2 is estimated at \$2.5 million, and we are confident that we can raise additional funds needed for the completion of this portion of the overall project within the next 2 years.

On behalf of the Vestry, the Long-Range Planning Committee has reengaged with Gray Hudson, our architect from WKWW Architects, to begin the Design Development phase of the project. This phase should take two to three months and will be followed by the creation of construction documents and contractor interviews. This Design Development phase with the architect is expected to begin in late July/early August.

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

King Herod heard of Jesus and his disciples, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him." But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised." For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

Wrought Iron Restoration to Begin

Worshipping in a sacred space that is also historic means that repairs, maintenance, and restoration are a given. Within the next couple weeks, Silkwood Painting Company will begin work to restore the wrought iron railing that surrounds the church campus. Silkwood is the same company that restored our historic parish hall windows a few years back. With over 700 linear feet of railing, this a large project and one that requires Silkwood's expertise. The Buildings & Grounds Committee recommended and the Vestry approved Silkwood for this project estimated to cost approximately \$25,000. Funding is anticipated to be secured with a grant through our relationship with the Lehto Foundation.
