Sunflowers and Ukraine

The sunflower is the national flower of Ukraine. Those bright, happy blooms, always turning to face the sun, seem ideal symbols for the beleaguered but undaunted people of Ukraine.

In 2022 we made available prayer cards and packets of sunflower seeds for you to take home and plant in your garden. As you began to see their growth, you were asked to remember the people of Ukraine and the ongoing war in that country following the invasion of Russia. Three years have gone by and yet Russia is still at war with Ukraine.

Today we have packets of sunflower seeds and prayer cards available for you to take home, and again plant in your garden. The



sunflowers will again be a constant reminder to you and others of the suffering faced by the people of Ukraine, and of all countries of the world still at war.

As your sunflowers bloom this summer, I encourage you to post photos of them on your favorite social media apps letting people of Ukraine and others at war know they are not forgotten.

Grow some sunflowers this summer. Plant them with your children, grandchildren, and neighbor children, telling them why, this year especially, sunflowers are symbols of hope.
