





The Second Reading: Second Thessalonians 3:6-13

Reader: A Reading from Paul's Second Letter to the Thessalonians.

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labor we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate.

For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. **People:** Thanks be to God.

Gradual Hymn 371 Thou, whose almighty word Moscow

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke 21:5-19.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, Jesus said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down." They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them. When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."





A WORD FROM THE RECTOR

I am pleased to announce that the vestry has selected Chambliss & Rabil Construction as the general contractor for St. Paul's renovation project. This is an exciting and significant step forward in our efforts to improve accessibility to and within our spiritual home for all individuals.

Our Construction Committee deserves a big round of applause. Mona Clites, William Gwathmey, Darren Jones, and Rob Nipper, all parishioners with extensive experience in the building industry, were tasked with helping us select a general contractor. In consultation with Gray Hudson, our architect, they worked diligently over the past several months and presented their findings at a special meeting of the vestry on October 26. The committee recommended Chambliss & Rabil, believing them to be the best fit for St. Paul's based on their established local presence, exemplary safety record, effective communication protocols, and demonstrated expertise in renovating active facilities.

The vestry unanimously approved the committee's recommendation, and if all goes according to plan, construction is expected to begin next summer.


