A CHRISTMAS LETTER FROM THE RECTOR



December 2025

Beloved of St. Paul's,

Have you ever wondered why the poinsettia is so popular at Christmas?

The tradition originates in Mexico, where according to legend, a young girl of humble means named Pepita was enroute to Christmas Eve services and concerned that she had nothing to give the baby Jesus on his birthday. Seeing her concern, her cousin Pedro consoled Pepita. "Don't worry," he said, "I am sure the smallest gift will make the baby Jesus happy." Pepita found some weeds on the side of the busy village road. She tied them together with a piece of string and waited for her chance to lay the makeshift bouquet at the manger. At the offering, she bypassed the ushers, approached the Nativity scene underneath the altar, and laid the bouquet at Jesus' manger. A little embarrassed by her meager gift, Pepita, with her head down, quickly returned to her seat. Hearing gasps, she looked up and noticed that her little bouquet of weeds had been transformed into a beautiful poinsettia. From that day forward, the people of Mexico called poinsettias "Flowers of the Holy Night," for the shape of the leaves recalls the Star of Bethlehem, and the red color symbolizes Christ's sacrifice, the giving up of himself for the sake of others.

This story echoes the last verse of *In the bleak midwinter*.

What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; if I were a wise man, I would do my part; yet what I can, I give him. Give my heart.

The legend of the poinsettia reminds us that it is not the size or the extravagance of the gift that warms the heart of God. Any gift, given in love, is beautiful and has the capacity to transform. We know this from the story of our Savior's birth. Christ did not come to us in great power or glory. Christ came to us in vulnerability. He came to us in a manger, born of a lowly handmaiden. And yet, from that meager beginning, God has so richly blessed and transformed the world. From that meager beginning, we have been given the gifts of forgiveness and eternal life, and that is so much more valuable than silver or gold.

This year, may we marvel at the poinsettias with the legend in mind. May we remember the gift that is Jesus Christ, and know that our own gifts, given in love, are beautiful and have the capacity to transform lives and the world around us.

A CHILDREN'S PRESENTATION OF THE NATIVITY

Please remain seated.

The congregation sings the first verse of "Blest be the King whose coming" as the children adorn the scene with palms.

Blest be the King whose coming is in the name of God! For him let doors be opened, no hearts against him barred! Not robed in royal splendour, in power and pomp comes he: but clad as are the poorest - such his humility.

The Narrator begins with the presentation of Bethlehem.

Narrator: This night is like no other night. It is a time to dream and sing our way to Bethlehem. The children will show us how to go. The little town we seek sits in the hill country some ten miles south of Jerusalem. For thousands of years the houses have gathered there on the hilltop like a family breaking bread. "Bethlehem" means "House of Bread." In the center of the village is a small inn. On this night it is overflowing with people seeking sleep and a place to eat. Behind the inn is a dark stable. A gray donkey chews his barley and broken straw while a weary cow leans and rests after the day's plowing in the valley. A sheep nearby is nearly asleep. All is still and quiet in the little town.

The children now bring forward the animals as the congregation sings verse one of the hymn "O Little Town of Bethlehem."

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by; yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting Light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

The Narrator continues with the presentation of Mary and Joseph.

Narrator: As night gathers, the last two travelers come slowly up the road. Look, there is a young woman about to be a mother. She is walking with her husband. They are Joseph and Mary from Nazareth! They have walked for six days to come to this city where King David was born, so long ago. They have come, like so many others, because the Roman emperor wants to count each one, so he can take their money as a tax. But it is late, and Mary is so weary. Where will they sleep? There is no room in the inn. They decide to sleep with the animals.

The children now bring forward Mary and Joseph as the congregation sings verse one of the hymn "Once in Royal David's City."

Once in royal David's city stood a lowly cattle shed, where a mother laid her baby in a manger for his bed: Mary was that mother mild, Jesus Christ her little child.

The Narrator continues with the presentation of the Baby Jesus.

Narrator: Stars brighten slowly in the sky. All creation holds its breath. Suddenly, from the stable, comes the cry of a newborn child! Mary gently wraps the baby in a blanket and lays him in the feed box that his father has filled with straw.

The children now bring forward the baby Jesus as all the congregation sings verse one of the hymn "Away in a Manger."

Away in a manger, no crib for his bed, the little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head. The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay, the little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay. The Narrator continues with The Presentation of the Angels and Shepherds.

Narrator: In the hills outside Bethlehem, shepherds watch their shadowy sheep. All at once, the dark is lost in light, and in the midst of the light is something even brighter: the faces of angels. The fearful shepherds then hear music in the sky, and a voice says clearly, "Do not be afraid. Listen, I bring you good news of great joy, a joy to be shared by all people. Today in the City of David a Savior is born! He is Christ, the Lord." Then more angels appear, a whole heavenly host of them, praising God and singing: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will to all people, everywhere." The shepherds run with joy across the fields to Bethlehem to the barn behind the inn. There they find the Holy Family and creep forward, overwhelmed with mystery, to find Nativity itself in the center of all that love.

The children now bring forward the angels as they lead the shepherds. The congregation sings verse two of the hymn "Angels from the Realms of Glory."

Shepherds in the field abiding, watching o'er your flocks by night, God with man is now residing; yonder shines the infant Light: come and worship, come and worship, worship Christ, the newborn King.

The Narrator continues with The Presentation of the Three Kings.

Narrator: Three camels plod up the road to Bethlehem. They have come from the East, far beyond the Arabian Desert, perhaps from as far as the Caspian Sea. The camels carry three kings, the wise ones, the Magi. They are following the wild star, the destiny they had never seen before, and they are following it, wherever it goes, to find the King its shining shows them.

The children now bring forward the three kings as the congregation sings verse one of the hymn "We Three Kings."

We three kings of Orient are, bearing gifts we traverse afar, field and fountain, moor and mountain, following yonder star. *Refrain:*

O star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright; westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to thy perfect light!

Narrator: The kings' journey ends in a new kind of king. Their restlessness rests at last. They fall to their knees and give him bright gold, sweet-smelling frankincense and bitter myrrh, brought so far with so much love. So now we all come, following the star, to find God with us. We come, as people have come all through the ages, to bring our own gifts to this Child, God's gift to us. So let us come and bring our own thanks and praise as we enter into the mystery of Christmas. *Please stand.*

and sisters.

The Christ candle is lit.

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

O God, you have caused this holy night to shine with the brightness of the true Light: Grant that we, who have known the mystery of that Light on earth, may also enjoy him perfectly in heaven; where with you and the Holy Spirit he lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

Please be seated.

The First Reading: Isaiah 9:2-7

Reader: A Reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness - on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian. For all the boots of the tramping warriors and all the garments rolled in blood shall be burned as fuel for the fire. 


